LANG 5000 Foundation in Listening and Speaking for Postgraduate Students

1.Course Information LANG 5000 is a one-credit course offered to full-time RPG students who have not fulfilled the University's RPG English Language Requirement (i.e. failed to attain Level 4 in one or more criteria in the Speaking Test in ELPA). Most students taking the course are in their Year 1 of RPG studies. Students attend three hours of class and complete up to six hours of out-of-class work, per week. The course is offered in Fall and Spring semesters. Assessment of the course is 100% coursework and on a pass/fail basis. The course focuses on helping students develop their Listening and Speaking skills, thus making it possible for them to cope with the linguistic demands of everyday oral communication in an English-medium university.
