LANG5070 Advanced Critical Writing for Academic Purposes

1. Course descriptions

LANG5070 is a three-credit, one semester academic writing course for students of the MSc in Global China Studies. The course aims to develop students' abilities to produce written texts of a range of genres, appropriate to the academic context, and demonstrate adequate control of syntax, lexis and style.

2. Pre-requisites

This course is open only to students of the MSc in Global China Studies. Students admitted with any IELTS subscore of 5.5 are required to take the course.

3. Aims of the course

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs):

- a. Write a range of academic texts demonstrating appropriate control of syntax.
- b. Express ideas clearly in spoken texts to an academic audience.
- c. Recognize the essential features of different written genres.
- d. Distinguish facts from opinions and extract salient points from written texts.
- e. Develop written arguments with reference to different sources.
- f. Demonstrate critical awareness of accuracy in written English.
