Course Description

LANG 1414 is a three-credit, one semester core course offered to non-Chinese language background students who have learned Chinese for less than 50 tuition hours. Students attend three hours of class and complete up to six hours of out-of-class work, per week. The course is offered in Fall and Spring semesters. It aims to equip students with Chinese reading and writing skills for daily and social purposes through a range of familiar topics. The course is taught in Putonghua supplemented with English.

Methods of instruction: interactive tutorials support active learning through group discussion, collaborative activities, peer learning, input, practice and feedback.

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

1. Acquire basic knowledge of Chinese characters (including the basic stroke, stroke order and the basic radicals).

2. Recognize characters and write the most commonly used Chinese characters, and input Chinese characters with the help of Chinese computer applications.
3. Understand specific information from introductory and narrative texts related to daily and social contexts.
4. Use simple sentences to introduce basic information closely related to personal life and study.
5. Demonstrate awareness of Chinese Culture.
6. Apply learning strategies including goal setting, evaluating learning strategies and resources, self-reflection to become an effective learner.

A	Excellent Performance	Demonstrates a full understanding of Pinyin, accurately mastering tones and writing all characters correctly. Identifies, corrects all errors in characters. Writes all characters accurately based on context, understands their meanings, and provides precise translations. Uses a full range of topic-related vocabulary with precision to deliver topics. Uses a full range of structures without grammatical or syntactical mistakes.
B	Good Performance	Demonstrates a wide understanding of Pinyin, with most tones mastered and most characters written correctly. Identifies, corrects most errors in characters accurately. Writes most characters accurately based on context, understands their meanings, and provides mostly accurate translations. Uses a wide range of topic-related vocabulary flexibly with some precision and occasional minor errors which do not require interpretation. Uses a wide range of structures with only very occasional inappropriate or basic /non-systematic errors.
C	Satisfactory Performance	Demonstrates a basic understanding of Pinyin, with fair accuracy in tones and some correct character writing. Identifies some errors in characters and makes some corrections accurately. Writes some characters based on context, has a basic understanding of meanings, but translation accuracy can be further improved. Uses use a range of topic-related vocabulary with some flexibility for most of the time and with a few errors. There are some noticeable errors which require interpretation but meaning can be understood. Uses a range of structures which are frequently error-free, though some grammatical mistakes persist.
D	Marginal Pass	Demonstrates a limited understanding of Pinyin, with frequent errors in tones and character writing. Identifies only a few errors in characters and makes attempts at correcting the errors, but most or all of them are incorrect. Writes a few characters based on context, has limited understanding of meanings, and provides mostly inaccurate translations. Uses an adequate range of topic-related vocabulary somewhat accurately and appropriately, but with little flexibility. There may be frequent errors, excessive repetition, and a lack of precision, which require interpretation. Makes frequent mistakes with more

		complex structures, though these rarely cause comprehension problems
F	Fail	Fails to demonstrate a basic understanding of Pinyin and character writing. Unable to reliably identify or correct errors in characters. Writes very few characters based on context, has minimal understanding of meanings, and translation abilities are poor. Uses a limited range of topic-related vocabulary. There are frequent and repeated errors with limited flexibility. Interpretation is required. Makes frequent errors even with simple structures and may cause some comprehension problems.
