Course Description

LANG4036 is designed to meet the language needs of ISD students who undertake project work for academic and professional purposes. Throughout a project life cycle, documentation and presentation are crucial for the ongoing appraisal and assessment. Content selection, organization and language use play a pivotal role in the perception of the quality of the work. This course continues the development of these skills in the context of the project work. Students are expected to adopt a discovery approach to further developing the language skills, in which they need to find solutions collaboratively to meet the various demands regarding the documentation and presentation by participating in the structured activities with regular instructor feedback, peer reviews and self-reflection.

- Self-directed learning (SDL) Project: Enhancing English proficiency

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

1. Students can understand and appreciate effective language use throughout the project life cycle, phases including initiation, planning, execution, monitoring, and closure.
2. Students can select, organize and present appropriate contents appropriately for project presentations, in various modes, including both the written and the spoken, for different contexts and audiences.
3. Students can demonstrate external and internal self-awareness when evaluating feedback from others and themselves for improvement.
4. Students can work collaboratively in a team to maximize their performance.

- Students can identify their needs in improving their language skills and able to employ strategies to raise their proficiency independently.

		coherence. Language use and delivery may be sometimes awkward but understandable in general. Proof in successful self-directed learning is given. Participation in consultations and peer review meets basic requirements.
D	Marginal Pass	Some assignment(s) may not be completed successfully. They may be missing or they may not fulfil the requirements.
F	Fail	Most or all assignments may not be complete. They may be missing or they may not fulfil the requirements.
