Course Description

LANG1210 is a comprehensive Japanese course that builds on learners' basic understanding of *hiragana*, *katakana*, and grammar while developing listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills.

Who Should Enroll:

- Beginners: The enrollment for this course is limited to beginners whose Japanese level is below N4 for JLPT. This course is suitable for students who have the basic knowledge of hiragana, katakana and fundamental Japanese grammar. Therefore, the course is not suitable for absolute beginners with no prior exposure to Japanese.
- For beginners seeking to develop practical communication skills only, consider LANG1211: Communicative Japanese for Beginners I (2 credits). If you prefer to focus on building vocabulary and grammar knowledge, the self-paced online course LANG1212: Japanese Vocabulary and Grammar Essentials I (1 credit) may be more suitable. Both LANG1211 & LANG1212 run over 8 weeks and use a pass/fail grading system.
- Entry Quiz and Beginner Declaration Form: Students are required to take an entry quiz to prove that they are beginners (below N4 level) with the basic knowledge of *hiragana*, *katakana*, *kanji*, and fundamental Japanese grammar, and submit a beginner declaration form to register for this course.

Course content:

- **Basics of Japanese**: We will start with reviewing *hiragana* and *katakana*, the fundamental writing systems in Japanese, similar to the alphabet in English.
- **Integrated Skills for Japanese**: You will learn the fundamental skills in the Japanese language, including speaking, listening, writing, reading, basic grammar, and related Japanese culture in this course.

• **Textbook Coverage**: We will use the following textbook, covering Lessons 1 to 12:

『大家的日本語 初級 I 改訂版』 Minna no Nihongo 2nd Edition(大新書局, 2015)

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Engage in Basic Conversations: Participate in basic Japanese conversations, including greetings, self-introductions, and asking and answering questions about names, nationalities, and daily activities.
- 2. Describe Locations and Ownership: Describe locations, affiliations, ownership, and the existence of people, animals, and objects using appropriate vocabulary and grammatical structures, including movement and transportation.
- 3. Express Preferences and Opinions: Express preferences, opinions, and reasons using adjectives and appropriate grammatical structures.
- 4. Recognize and Interpret Language: Recognize and interpret basic Japanese vocabulary, grammar, and writing systems in daily communication.
- 5. Understand Japanese Culture: Demonstrate an understanding of Japanese culture and social norms.
