#### **Course Description**

This 1-credit self-paced online course is designed for students beginning their journey in Japanese, with a focus on building a solid and comprehensive foundation in vocabulary and grammatical structures. It runs over 8 weeks and adopts a pass/fail grading system.

# **Who Should Enroll:**

- **Beginners**: This course is ideal for absolute beginners and beginners who:
  - Have no prior knowledge of Japanese, or
  - Have some exposure to Japanese (e.g., studied *hiragana/katakana* or basic grammar) but wish to refresh and rebuild their foundational vocabulary and grammar in Japanese.
- Students are also encouraged to take the 2-credit course LANG1211: Communicative Japanese for Beginners I (2 credits) alongside LANG1212 to reinforce their learning through face-to-face conversational practice and real-life scenarios.
- Beginners who already have a basic foundation in Japanese—such as knowledge of hiragana, katakana, and elementary kanji—and who prefer a steady pace of study while aiming to develop comprehensive skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) may consider enrolling in LANG1210: Japanese Language and Culture for Beginners I (3 credits).

## **Course content:**

- **Basics of Japanese**: We will start with learning *hiragana* and *katakana*, the fundamental writing systems in Japanese, similar to the alphabet in English.
- Comprehensive grammar explanations and vocabulary exercises to build a strong foundation in Japanese sentence construction, word usage, and language patterns—without live class participation.
- Textbook Recommendation: The content of this course is closely aligned with Lessons

1–12 of the textbook 『大家的日本語 初級 I 改訂版』 (*Minna no Nihongo* 2nd Edition, 大新書局, 2015). While the course provides comprehensive online learning materials, students are **strongly encouraged** to obtain a copy of the textbook to **supplement their learning** through additional practice, exercises, and reference.

## **Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)**

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an understanding of the fundamental Japanese writing system (*hiragana* and *katakana*) and basic pronunciation rules.
- 2. Identify and recall essential vocabulary for basic communication in Japanese, including common nouns, verbs, adjectives, and expressions.
- 3. Explain and apply basic grammar structures, such as sentence formation, verb conjugations, and particle usage.
- 4. Interpret and comprehend simple Japanese texts, including short passages and dialogues.
- 5. Construct simple sentences and short paragraphs in Japanese for everyday communication.

### **Assessment and Grading**

This course adopts a **Pass/Fail grading system** to support a low-pressure and learner-centred environment. Students must complete all required tasks and demonstrate achievement of the course's Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) to pass.

### **Grading Rubrics**

This course uses a Pass/Fail grading system. To pass, students must demonstrate consistent engagement and satisfactory achievement of the course's Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) across all assessment components.

#### Pass Criteria:

- Complete all required chatbot interaction worksheets (Modules 1–5), demonstrating effort and understanding.
- Achieve a minimum threshold score on online quizzes (Modules 1–5), showing comprehension of vocabulary and grammar.
- Attend and complete the final exam with evidence of basic proficiency in sentence construction, vocabulary usage, and grammar application.
- Show progress and engagement through self-paced activities, including video lectures and practice tasks.

#### Fail Criteria:

Students may fail the course if they:

- Consistently fail to submit key assignments.
- Score significantly below the threshold on multiple online quizzes.
- Do not attend or complete the final exam.
- Demonstrate insufficient understanding of core course content or lack of engagement.

In addition to the criteria above, students must achieve a minimum overall score of 50% to pass the course.

## Feedback and Support:

- Instructors will provide individualized feedback via Canvas throughout the course.
- Students are encouraged to attend the Week 7 consultation to clarify doubts and receive

guidance before the final exam.
