Course Description

LANG2202 is a continuation of LANG1212. This new **1-credit** self-paced online course is designed to provide a flexible and focused learning experience in vocabulary and grammar at the upper-beginner level. It runs over **8 weeks** and adopts **a pass/fail grading system**.

Who Should Enroll:

- **Upper-beginners**: This course is ideal for upper-beginners who:
 - Want to build on LANG1212: Japanese Vocabulary and Grammar Essentials I, to expand vocabulary and deepen understanding of grammar structures, and prepare themselves for intermediate-level Japanese studies.
- Students are also encouraged to take the 2-credit course LANG2201: Communicative Japanese for Beginners II (2 credits) alongside LANG2202 to reinforce their learning through face-to-face conversational practice and real-life scenarios.
- Upper-beginners who prefer a regular pace of study and aim to develop comprehensive skills (listening, speaking, reading, and writing) may consider LANG2200: Japanese Language and Culture for Beginners II (3 credits).

Course content:

- The course consists of six self-paced online modules, featuring video lectures, interactive chatbot exercises, and online quizzes to reinforce sentence structures, word usage, and grammar patterns.
- Comprehensive grammar explanations and vocabulary exercises to build a strong foundation in Japanese sentence construction, word usage, and language patterns—without live class participation.
- Textbook Recommendation: The content of this course is closely aligned with Lessons

13–25 of the textbook 『大家的日本語 初級 II 改訂版』 (Minna no Nihongo Shokyu II 2nd Edition, 大新書局, 2015). While the course provides comprehensive online learning materials, students are **strongly encouraged** to obtain a copy of the textbook to **supplement their learning** through additional practice, exercises, and reference.

Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Formulate sentences and short paragraphs to describe everyday activities, experiences, and changes, using approximately 1,000 vocabulary words.
- 2. Construct grammatically accurate sentences using *te*-form, *nai*-form, *ru*-form, and *ta*-form to express actions, requests, obligations, and prohibitions.
- 3. Differentiate and apply polite and plain speech appropriately in various contexts.
- 4. Form complex sentences by incorporating conjunctions, relative clauses, reported speech, and hypothetical statements.
- 5. Express opinions, describe experiences, and discuss giving and receiving in structured sentences.

Assessment and Grading

This course adopts a **Pass/Fail grading system** to support a low-pressure and learner-centered environment. Students must complete all required tasks and demonstrate achievement of the course's Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) to pass.

Grading Rubrics

This course uses a Pass/Fail grading system. To pass, students must demonstrate consistent engagement and satisfactory achievement of the course's Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) across all assessment components.

Pass Criteria:

- Complete all required chatbot interaction worksheets (Modules 1–5), demonstrating effort and understanding.
- Achieve a minimum threshold score on online quizzes (Modules 1–5), showing comprehension of vocabulary and grammar.
- Attend and complete the final exam with evidence of basic proficiency in sentence construction, vocabulary usage, and grammar application.
- Show progress and engagement through self-paced activities, including video lectures and practice tasks.

Fail Criteria:

Students may fail the course if they:

- Consistently fail to submit key assignments.
- Score significantly below the threshold on multiple online quizzes.
- Do not attend or complete the final exam.
- Demonstrate insufficient understanding of core course content or lack of engagement.

In addition to the criteria above, students must achieve a minimum overall score of 50% to pass the course.

Feedback and Support:

- Instructors will provide individualized feedback via Canvas throughout the course.
- Students are encouraged to attend the Week 7 consultation to clarify doubts and receive guidance before the final exam.
