Course Description

This is a four-and-a-half-week course worth one credit, targeting students with non-Chinese language background. The course aims to enhance their ability to pronounce Chinese words correctly and increase their awareness of Pinyin spelling rules, tone sandhi, neutral tone, and as well as to help them identify the differences between easily confused tones, initials and finals. After completing this course, students will be able to use Pinyin as a tool to pronounce commonly used Chinese words and sentences in daily life.

1. Demonstrate understanding of the Pinyin system
2. Distinguish between easily confused tones, initials, finals in Putonghua
3. Demonstrate understanding of neutral tone, tone sandhi and erhua in Putonghua
4. Demonstrate understanding of Pinyin spelling rules and regulations
5. Pronounce commonly used Chinese words and sentences for daily life accurately using the Pinyin system

Mapping of Course ILOs to Assessment Tasks

Assessment tasks	Mapped ILOs	Explanation
Review Quiz (In-class)	ILO-2, ILO-3, ILO-4	This task assesses students' various abilities, such as distinguishing between easily confused tones, initials and finals (ILO-2), demonstrating an understanding of neutral tone, tone sandhi (ILO-3), as well as understanding spelling rules and regulations (ILO-4).
Oral Assessment (In-class) Script Reading & Self-introduction	ILO-1, ILO-4, ILO-5	This task assesses students' ability to appropriately and accurately apply skills of Putonghua Pinyin system and spelling rules from the course in basic daily communication contexts (ILO1, ILO4 and ILO5).
Self-directed learning: Canvas quizzes & self-reflection	ILO-2, ILO-3, ILO-4	This task consolidates students' ability not only to practice Pinyin skills effectively (ILO2, ILO3 and ILO4) but also to developing their Putonghua phonetic awareness through online quizzes and self-reflection.
